

# Equity Impact Grant Guidelines & Application

### I. Background

The County of San Diego is committed to the well-being of all San Diegans. The Office of Equity and Racial Justice (OERJ) was established in 2020 to strengthen the County of San Diego's commitment to racial equity, with the intent that race no longer be a determining factor in a person's life outcomes. This approach supports groups across ethnicity, gender, age, ability, and other identities to live and participate in our society to their full potential.

The OERJ has held an ongoing series of listening sessions in the community to gather input from residents on how the county can help to undo structural racism and its effects on the region's Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC) and other historically marginalized and currently disadvantaged and disenfranchised communities. A common point of feedback has been the difficulty in pursuing government contracts and philanthropic funding for organizations with limited fundraising capacity, especially for grassroots and small organizations led by individuals from BIPOC communities. To begin addressing this challenge, the County is piloting a new program over two cycles to support these organizations by providing both operating grants and training, coaching and other tailored support.

Each cycle the Equity Impact Grant (EIG) program will support 10 qualified San Diego-based social impact organizations/initiatives by providing each with \$100,000 general operating support grants. Funds can be used to support staffing and other operating costs. In addition to general operating support grants, the County has contracted with The Nonprofit Institute at the University of San Diego to provide support resources, including coaching and workshops on leadership, nonprofit governance, social change and innovation, fundraising, power-building, collective impact, and organizational resiliency. Furthermore, County OERJ staff will schedule





periodic check ins with grantees to foster a relationship of shared learning and tracking of grant impact.

The Equity Impact Grant program will focus on supporting community-driven efforts and community-based organizations working in the social justice fields in the following areas:

- education (early childhood through higher/continuing education)
- civic engagement and movement building
- arts, media, and culture
- housing and community development
- public safety and restorative justice
- health and healing
- financial literacy and economic development
- food systems and environmental justice

It is anticipated that the EIG program will have a positive impact on the community-based efforts to promote equity of opportunity, fortify resident-led projects that center voices of those with lived experience<sup>1</sup> under structural racism, and improve long-term outcomes of BIPOC and LGBTQIA+ communities, immigrants, people with disabilities, women, and youth. Likewise, the Office of Equity and Racial Justice hopes to use the EIG program to build relationships with a growing community of grantees based on trust and mutual accountability.

## II. Eligibility & Alignment:

- 1. Your organization has <u>501c(3)</u> status, is fiscally sponsored by a 501c(3) organization, or is a <u>tax-exempt tribal organization</u>.
- 2. Your 501c(3) organization is <u>based and serves communities in</u> the Greater San Diego County (including all tribal and rural communities).
- 3. Your <u>operating expenses are under \$500,000 and/or personnel</u> <u>of under five full-time employees</u>.
- 4. Your organization's mission and/or program(s) align with funding priorities (see above).
- 5. Your organization <u>is helping to build power and/or advance life</u> <u>outcomes</u> among BIPOC and LGBTQIA+ communities, immigrants, people with disabilities, women, and youth
- 6. Your organization's <u>staff and board have lived experience</u> with and are representative of communities they seek to impact such as, low income, housing insecure, food insecure, economically depressed, overpoliced, criminal justice system impacted, and environmental justice communities.

#### III. WHAT TO EXPECT FOR THE APPLICATION:

The following application consists of three main sections:

- 1. Part I will screen to ensure eligibility (See Application Questions Screening Questions)
- 2. Part II will capture some of organizational details like name, address, EIN of the organization or fiscal sponsor, annual expenses, and personnel
- 3. Part II, the narrative section, is an opportunity to share some of your organization's story and impact (consisting of, but not limited to, the *lived experience* of your organization's leadership, history/future of your community impact, how the EIG program resources could support your impact, etc.)





We estimate the total time needed to complete this application is one hour.

#### IV. CRITERIA FOR DECISION-MAKING:

- A. Power Building and Advancing Life Outcomes:
  - 1. Is there a clear focus, alignment, effort, and actionable vision to build power and/or advance life outcomes of San Diego's historically and perpetually disenfranchised populations: BIPOC, LGBTQIA+, immigrant, people with disabilities, women, and youth?
  - 2. Does the application provide examples and approaches to past, current, and/or future work/impact?
  - 3. Does the application explicitly name how the organization builds power within said communities? (empowers community to advocate for their rights, address systemic inequalities, create a positive social change?)

#### B. Lived Experience Represented:

- 1. Does the organizations leadership, staff, and board have lived experience with and are representative of the communities they seek to serve and impact?
- 2. Is there a clear and distinct articulation of how the organization reflects/understand the communities in which they work?

#### C. Use of Provided Resources:

- 1. Is there a clear understanding of how available program resources will be used?
- 2. Is the desired use of resources in alignment with both the organizations mission/vision/desired impact AND the mission/intention of the Equity Impact Grant Program?
- 3. Is there are clear understanding of how program resources can be sustained overtime?





Applications will close 5pm, August 23, 2024, Awardees will be announced in November 2024.
