About the Sheriff's Office

The Sheriff's Office is the chief law enforcement agency in the County of San Diego, covering over 4,200 square miles and a population of over 3.3 million.

The department operates seven detention facilities, eighteen patrol stations, a crime laboratory, and an array of support operations necessary to provide full law enforcement services for the County of San Diego.

Primary police services are provided to nearly 1 million county residents, including those in nine contract cities, the Grossmont/Cuyamaca Community College District, and 18 Indian reservations.

The Sheriff's Office has over 4,700 employees who provide general law enforcement, detention, and court security services, as well as regional investigative support and tactical emergency response.

About the Sheriff's Office (Cont.)


The Sheriff's Office is responsible for booking arrestees and releasing incarcerated persons, ensuring court appearances, and providing necessary daily care for nearly 4,000 incarcerated persons per day in 2023.

Last year, the Sheriff's detention facilities processed 50,169 unduplicated bookings.

Additionally, Reentry Services provides programming to incarcerated individuals in a trauma-informed culture that is gender responsive as well as incorporates a vast number of program and rehabilitative efforts to reduce recidivism.

Services provided to the San Diego Superior Court include weapons screening and courtroom security.


The Sheriff's Office also serves as the County's levying and enforcement agency for the execution, service and return of all writs, warrants, and temporary restraining orders.





San Diego County Sheriff's Office - All Funds FY 2024-26 Adopted Budget by Bureau



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



Improvements Within the Jails



Wellness Checks

We have created a wellness protocol, called Wellness Checks, with a multidisciplinary group of our staff that includes sworn staff, medical and mental health providers as well as correctional counselors.

This program is designed for individuals who may not necessarily be able to communicate or advocate for their needs. This is to ensure individuals are eating, bathing, taking medication, and are responding well to the therapy they are receiving.

These wellness checks are above and beyond mandated Title 15 security checks and is in addition to routine medical and mental healthcare checkups.

Body Scanners / Screening

The Sheriff's Office has moved forward with procuring the latest technology body scanners in a continuing effort to eliminate the introduction of illegal narcotics into jail facilities.

New employee screening, launched in July 2024, for Sheriff's personnel, both sworn and professional staff, as well as contractors, volunteers, and professional visitors who enterour county jails undergo a screening, including their belongings.

A Sheriff's K-9 trained in detecting illegal drugs is also present during the screening process.





Improvements Within the Jails



Voluntary Urine Screening/ Medication Assisted Treatment

Everyone who is booked into our detention facilities undergoes a medical evaluation, including a voluntary urine screening. This helps us identify any substances people have in their system when they come into our facilities. The information guides the treatment plan they will receive from Sheriff's Medical Services.

This unit has methodically closed the gaps in our security systems that would allow narcotic smuggling. The team is specially trained in narcotic detection and prevention at intake. These teams use an informaticled policing approach, combined with body scanners, for enhanced identification of dangerous and illicit substances.

We have seen record narcotics interceptions at the point of booking from individuals who were attempting to smuggle them into the jails; these interceptions have had a direct impact on the decrease of overdoses taking place within the facilities.

Created a centralized mail processing center to proactively stop laced letters from reaching into the facilities.

Improvements Within the Jails



New Provider Presence at Intake

Physicians and Nurse Practitioners will be added to the intake process.

Incarcerated persons presenting with medical symptoms will be evaluated prior to housing module assignment (conditions include Cardiac, Diabetes, History of Chronic Illness, Acute Withdrawal, and ADA Needs. Incarcerated persons identified as unsheltered will also be seen by provider).

Provider will complete a health assessment and prescribe treatment as indicated.

Provider will schedule new patient for a follow -up appointment.

SDCJ will be the initial lead-off facility in November 2024.

Partnering to establish a secured hospital ward, which will provide inpatient health care services for incarcerated persons, in addition to security services for incarcerated persons provided by SDSO.

This partnership will build on the goal of improving effective and quality care by managing a secured hospital ward that will provide 19 beds for exclusive use by SDSO'S Hospital Guard Unit.

Anticipated use is slated for January 2025.





Reentry Services Division

The Reentry Services Division provides evidence -based reentry services striving to reduce returns to custody and increase public safety in collaboration with criminal justice partners and community agencies.

The Reentry Services Division is committed to providing quality services and programs to support people in custody and prepare them for a successful transition back into the community.

The Reentry Services Division has adapted programs, classes, and services to accommodate both the sentenced and unsentenced populations. They serve high-level classifications and meet both long and shorterm reentry needs.

SDSO is a leader in Reentry Services:

In 2023, the Sheriff's Office's sponsored bill, Assemble Bill 1329, was signed by the Governor and authorized the San Diego County Sheriff's Office and the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) to implement a 5-year pilot program to run the DMV's California Identification Card (CAUD) program with our Reentry Services to benefit incarcerated persons,

On November 16, 2023, at the 27th Annual Golden Watchdog and Fleece Awards held by the San Diego County Taxpayers Association (SDCTA), SDSO's Reentry Services was presented with the Public & Private Partnership Award.



Gun Safety Events

Since 2021, the Sheriff's Office has conducted Gun Safety Events, more commonly known as gun buybacks, throughout the county to get firearms off the street.

The goal is to make the Gun Safety Event a community effort. There is purposeful dialogue to raise awareness of gun violence in the community and to encourage residents to address gun violence.

From 2021 to 2023, the Sheriff's Office held 10 Gun Safety Events and collected 2,108 firearms during those events.

These Gun Safety Events are a part of SDSO's broader effort to reduce gun violence in communities and prioritize the safety of everyone in San Diego County.

The first gun safety event held on an Indian Reservation occurred this year on the Pala Reservation.

The Sheriff's Office also received a \$1 million grant to reduce the backlog of prohibited persons with firearms.

Homeless Outreach


The Sheriff's Office'**Homeless Assistance Resource Team** (HART) performs to enhance connections for at-risk individuals to health and social services workers through homeless outreach.

Established in June of 2019, the Homeless Assistance Resource Team (HART) perform homeless outreach operations throughout the unincorporated areas of San Diego County.

HART operations focus on identifying individuals experiencing homelessness and offering wrap around services in partnership with community-based organizations and County departments; conduct environmental cleanups; and work with service providers to offer resources to assist individuals with a path to permanent housing.

In FY23-24, HART made 4,010 contacts with unhoused individuals, conducted 821 homeless outreach events, housed 475 people at risk for homelessness, and completed 261 clean - up operations in collaboration with County partners.

Additionally, North County Sheriff Captains are leading the North County regional homeless outreach effort combining deputies with Oceanside, Escondido, and Carlsbad Police Departments.



Combatting Fentanyl



Education

The Sheriff's Office conducts numerous presentations on the danger of illicit drugs such as fentanyl.

Presentations are provided at many community meetings and townhalls, to our immigrant and refugee communities, and during the curriculum of the Sheriff's Spanish Academy.



Enforcement

The Fentanyl Abatement and Suppression Team's mission is to identify, disrupt and dismantle fentanyl distribution networks in San Diego County to reduce fentanyl related crimes as well as fatal and nofatal fentanyl overdoses. FAST will work to ensure prosecution is achieved for fentanyl traffickers and dealers who sell deadly doses of fentanyl.



Harm Reduction

The Harm Reduction Kits consist of a box of Naloxone containing two doses of the nasal spray.

Sheriff's Deputies hand out free Harm Reduction Kits when they respond to calls for service. Community Members can also get them for free at any Sheriff's Station and Substation. No questions asked.

Sheriff's Spanish Academy Academia de Alguacil

The Sheriff's Spanish Academy is a multieek program in partnership with the San Diego County Office of Education - Migrant Education program. It is designed as a relationship-building program to help provide equity in educating our Spanish-speaking community about law enforcement procedures and available resources in San Diego County.

The program is done entirely in Spanish, with curriculum based on reoccurring themes presented by community members and needs deputies experience in the communities.

Blue Envelope Program

The Blue Envelope Program is designed to promote inclusivity and serve as an enhanced communication awareness tool between law enforcement and community members diagnosed with a condition or disability such as Autism Spectrum Disorder, dementia, anxiety or other conditions that might require additional accommodations or awareness during a law enforcement interaction.

The program was designed in collaboration between the San Diego County Sheriff's Office, community organizations, the San Diego County Police Chiefs' and Sheriff's Association and the San Diego County Board of Supervisors.

The Blue Envelope Program works by allowing an individual to readily display the Blue Envelope logo or present a Blue Envelope upon contact with law enforcement or other community service personnel. The Blue Enveloperanded products can contain the individual's identification, contact information or pertinent vehicle operating documents such as the vehicle registration and proof of insurance.

The Blue Envelope Program does not have a registry component; therefore, the program is voluntary and selfmplemented.


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
