Meeting Summary

1. QUORUM

The Chair determined that quorum was met and called the meeting to order.

2. WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS

Jurisdictions representatives and guests introduced themselves.

3. REVIEW OF THE JULY 9, 2020 MEETING SUMMARY

Avecita Jones, City of Carlsbad motioned to approve the July, 9 Meeting Summary.

4. PUBLIC COMMENTS AND COMMUNICATIONS

Mallika Sen, Solana Center for Environmental Innovation: The Solana Center for Environmental Innovation in partnership with the County of San Diego will be hosting 4 rain barrel distribution events. In addition, the Solana Center is looking into opportunities and

5. CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

Eric Wolff, County of San Diego: The Recycle Right campaign will launch on August 17th. This is an informational campaign that focuses on recycling correctly and reducing contamination. The campaign includes the Recycle Right newsletter disseminated to unincorporated area residents and businesses, a press release through I Love a Clean San Diego, and radio and social media/digital advertisements that direct interested residents to find more information on the Recycle Right [webpage](#). The County received an inquiry regarding trash and litter around the freeways. Eric requested information on whether other jurisdictions had ordinances regarding this topic.

7. PRESENTATION

Julia Dolloff, CalRecycle: The SB 1383 formal rulemaking process began in January 2019 and included 5 comment periods, two formal hearings and a public workshop. Regulations are anticipated to be adopted by the Office of Administrative Law in Fall 2020. Regulations will become enforceable in 2022 and jurisdictions will be required to take enforcement against noncompliant entities in 2024.

Jurisdiction responsibilities include:

1. Provide organics collection services to all residents and businesses
 - This includes automatically providing service or universal service to residents and businesses and having participation through a One-, Two-, or Three Container service unless they have been granted a waiver by the jurisdiction.
 - CalRecycle will have oversight of entities not subject to local control including state agencies and K-12 schools.
2. Establish an edible food recovery program
 - The distinction between what cities are responsible for and what counties are responsible for regarding implementing an edible food recovery program is Article 11 – capacity planning.
3. Conduct education and outreach to the community
 - Educational material must be linguistically accessible to non-English speaking residents.

4. Procure recyclable and recovered organic products
 - CalRecycle will provide a calculator with the conversion factors for compost, renewable gas, and electricity from biomass conversion made from organic waste. CalRecycle will notify jurisdictions of their targets prior to January 2022.
5. Adopt an ordinance or other enforceable requirement that requires compliance with CalGreen and Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance requirements.
6. Secure access to recycling and edible food recovery capacity
 - Counties, cities, special districts that provide solid waste collection services, and regional agencies located within the county must plan for adequate capacity for recycling organic waste and edible food recovery.
 - CalRecycle will provide tools to help jurisdictions with capacity planning for organic waste and edible food recovery. Tools are anticipated to be available the fourth quarter of 2021.
7. Monitor compliance and conduct enforcement.
 - Jurisdictions are required to have an enforcement mechanism by January 1, 2022 with enforcement beginning in 2024.
 - January 2022-December 2023, jurisdictions should focus on educating generators of the requirements before mandatory enforcement in 2024.
8. Jurisdictions are required to maintain records and keep information in an implementation record.

CalRecycle oversight begins 2022.

- CalRecycle will authorize low population and rural area waivers, which delay or exclude implementation of some of the requirements.
- CalRecycle will be responsible for ensuring compliance for entities exempt from local solid waste oversight including school districts and federal facilities, However, jurisdictions are required to provide education and outreach.
- CalRecycle will be evaluating a jurisdiction's compliance and will establish a process for conducting jurisdiction audits.

CalRecycle will have four tools: model franchise agreement, model mandatory organics disposal reduction ordinance, model organic waste product procurement policy, and model edible food recovery agreement available once the regulations have been approved to assist jurisdictions with SB 1383 implementation. In addition, CalRecycle has customizable AB 827 model signage that is SB 1383 compliant available on their [website](#). CalRecycle is continuing work on a statewide public education campaign that will include research about the most effective outreach methods for recycling communications and the most effective messages to change recycling behavior. Colleen Foster, City of Oceanside: In preparation of upcoming organics recycling requirements, The City of Oceanside amended the Waste Management franchise agreement to provide mandatory food scrap collection services to all Oceanside businesses. This process included an 11.59% commercial rate increase and a 5.08% residential rate increase.

Prior to COVID, the food scraps recycling program was scheduled to rollout in two phases including an initial phase of outreach and field audits to assist businesses in “right-sizing” their bins and a second phase of onsite training, bin delivery and follow up through January – May 2020. Acceptable materials include food (meat, bones, dairy, bread, etc.) and food-soiled paper collected in either a brown 64-gallon cart or 2-cubic yard bin.

Due to the onset of COVID, the City halted all bin deliveries and visits on March 16 and notified businesses of the delay. The 4-month rollout was then rescheduled to a 12-month rollout timeline to include redevelopment of call scripts and outreach resources, conducting virtual site assessments, confirming service changes and tracking site changes.
