b. Presentation: COPIA: Technology Driven Food Recovery Service Creating Efficient Processes and Compliance By: Kimberly Smith, CEO

- COPIA is a nationwide food recovery service that is the first automated food recovery donation service. COPIA is an app that matches food donors to local non-profits on a 1 to 1 basis. They have partners who can assist with transportation if needed. COPIA acts as a third-party coordinator that does not handle any physical aspects of the process. 3. SB 1383 – Implementation, Discussion, Q&A

a. Capacity Planning Discussion (Due Aug 1, 2024)

- [Ekolojik](#) – Updating business data.
 - County will send an RFI in Jan (with due date of May 15) to call for:
 - Estimated edible food disposal.
 - Estimated FRO capacity in FRO jurisdiction.

- Jurisdictions can use a combination of methods to determine capacity: Reports from FROs and spot surveys of FROs in your jurisdiction (sample questions in regional documents)
 - The County will not be doing a region wide survey.
- Tier 1 and 2 Disposal tool, review
 - County is updating tool with 2022 WCS data from CalRecycle and will roll it out in January. Will have training for the tool at the January EFR meeting.
 - County of San Diego –Jurisdictions should ask FROs if they can accept more capacity-not only what they currently take.
 - Others are encouraged to check Tier 2 identifications for capacity as the County checked hauler data and found some information was not correct.
 - You can manually exclude businesses that technically qualify as Tier 2 but you know from site visits/other work do not qualify.
 - County has sample survey questions on the regional guidance tab called survey questions that you can use on site visits. Link on bottom of agenda.

b. Tier 1 & 2 – Questions & Discussion

- City of San Diego – Questions on grey areas
 - Events: For events, we are unclear on the charges for entry parameters. For instance, do we need to include marathons where you pay to run but the post events are typically open to the public? How about events that are private with free tickets? Fundraisers that don't charge for entry but do have a donation requirement?
 - CalRecycle is working on guidance.
 - Malls are included under the definition of venues but what exactly is a venue and what exactly is a mall. There are many shopping centers but what is the line between strip mall and a mall?
 - Ekolojik: There are some answers on the regional document about grey areas that may help on the mall questions.
- North County Food Policy Council GIS Platform – What comes after Tier 2? What measures is the State planning to take to measure city/county compliance and enforce compliance? Will there be GIS mapping regarding SB 1383 implementation?
 - CalRecycle does not have anything planned for after Tier 2. Jurisdictions can take more stringent requirements if they choose. They are working on vetting resources to measure and enforce compliance. They do not have any plans for mapping capabilities to their knowledge right now.

c. Site Visits/Inspections – DEHQ Myths and Challenges

- DEHQ offered to host a webpage on County website for regional SB 1383 resources
 - Task: All jurisdictions to add their resources on Regional Guidance documents under the tab Jurisdiction&DEH Contacts
 - Update “Jurisdiction&DEH Contacts” with new points of contact and add correct webpages with information for businesses.
 - County of San Diego-DEHQ – Looking to get the webpage up and running soon. Interest in resources for restaurants and donors to put up point of contacts in each jurisdiction. Will send this information to every food recovery organization registered on their newsletter list. Vanessa is best contact if you have questions.

d. Recordkeeping & Reporting (FRO’s and Generators)

- City of Escondido – Will CalRecycle visit jurisdictions to check on the compliance of Tier II businesses?
 - CalRecycle –Jurisdiction and Agency Compliance Enforcement branch (JACE) determines what information they are looking for. They will be examining EARs and Tier 2 will not be in the system till end of 2024. For more specific questions, contact emily.schuetz@CalRecycle.ca.gov.
- City of Carlsbad –How should businesses seeking to meet compliance by donating to employees track data for reporting?
 - CalRecycle – Encourage them to document information to show that donations are minimal so they can show that the amount is minimal for inspectors. Documentation can be done informally using Excel, etc.
