3. SB 1383 – Implementation, Discussion, Q&A

- a. Tier 1 & 2 Questions & Discussion
 - i. Non-local entities
 - Ekologik: University center / community center often can be non-local entity while if they meet the seating or serving threshold it may meet large venue definition
 - 2. CalRecycle: State agency location w food preparation space and coffee carts, the areas that are fitting the edible food generator space within the larger space would apply to surplus edible food generators
 - 3. County: federal and navy bases as non-local entities
 - a. CalRecycle: Private business on grounds of federal facility must comply, jurisdiction must inspect and ensure compliance. Federal entities who run these locations on federal facility – no inspection needed, not enforcing. Ask about business ownership to help make distinction.

 - a. Reminder: corporate policies do not override SB 1383 requirements
 - b. CalRecycle guidance from new FAQ: "How should it be verified that a commercial edible food generator is donating their "maximum amount of edible food" if inspectors do not have food safety expertise?

Inspection of commercial edible food generators' required recordkeeping will aid in determining that the maximum amount of edible food is being recovered. Section 18991.4(a)(3)(D) of the regulations requires commercial edible food generators to keep records of the quantity of food collected or self-hauled for recovery.

The inspector should review the commercial edible food generator's records.

- If the business has too few donations that do not seem to align with the size of their operations, then this could be a red flag, e.g., a grocery store that has only a few donations of loaves of bread.
- If there is something that is interpreted as a red flag upon inspection
 of a commercial edible food generator, the inspector could talk to
 the business to better understand the circumstance and also consult,
 as needed, with their local environmental health department who
 has knowledge of the food safety requirements.

The generator is responsible for understanding the food safety requirements of the California Retail Food Code and applying that knowledge to donate the maximum amount of their edible food that would otherwise be disposed. Section 18991.3(e) of the SB 1383 regulations prohibits generators from intentionally spoiling edible food that could be safely recovered. The generator may need to be educated about the types of edible food that they could be recovering."

- 2. Tracking is only available to non-profits not to individuals (not a requirement to track donations to individuals (e.g.: staff) but it is helpful for inspections/best practice)
- 3. Weights are manually being track/entered into platform at this time, being explored in future
- 4. Temperature tracking option is available (can be set as a generator profile standpoint)
- 5. Free, premium food mover/other basic accts can be gifted to other users, executive municipalities, corporate for corporations; account types both free and paid available
- 6. Data aggregation capabilities from foodbanks and non-food bank associated recovery import activities, can be maintained by municipalities and/or generators/recovery orgs as needed
- 7. Partnership with DoorDash and just charges the cost of the driver if there are no nonprofits that can do the pickup
