 - ii. Also need to educate these facilities on the minimum number of LBS accepted for each food bank and their partners.
 - 1. Encourage the food facilities to drop donations themselves and make sure they follow food safety guidelines.
 - 2. (City of SD) For events, we are unclear on the "charges for entry" parameters. For instance, do we need to include marathons where you pay to run, but the post events are typically open to the public? <u>See</u>

iii. (City of SD) Malls are included under the definition of venues, but what exactly is a venue and what exactly is a mall? There are many "shopping centers" but what is the line between a strip mall and a mall?

-Defined as a large venue like a mall food court? -Some share waste/recycling, some are individual. How to set parameters around classifying Plazas and Strip Malls as large venues. What is the distinction between a shopping mall of over 2,000 visitors a day (large venue) and mature as we learn more a plaza or other commercial area with a collection of Strip individual businesses that Malls & cumulatively has over 2,000 Plazas visitors a day? How would this be measured? Nobody keeps Tier vs. numbers in a strip mall. malls

ultimately up to the jurisdictions. Strip mall not a mall. Mall = internal walking space only, strip malls = large venue? If a generator meets criteria in the mall, they would comply regardless. CalR still working of definition and will circle back. Program will about the businesses and whether they even have edible food. STRIP MALLS NOT DEFINED A MALL. But if there is seperate rest. or other generator, that would be included

mall = main doors closed, UTC. are people hanging out? Food court? Food court may define it as a venue where people are hanging out. "Other" tab. Consistent definitions, keep good notes. more in person inspections, keep in a maybe list. couldn't hurt to visit the businesses. Jackie: definition as having a food court. Difference is that food court has a communal eating area. Strip mall rest have seperate waste areas.
