      - a. North County Food Policy County Will follow up in an email with GIS maps. We need to find a way to support and compensate Brian and his club.
      - b. HF&F Consultants There is a critical need for labor for this type of work in response to these regulations. Jurisdictions should seek ways to support or compensation organizations such as this.
      - c. Canyon Crest Sustainable Initiatives Steep learning curve in the beginning, club retains records of all interactions.

### 3. SB 1383 – Implementation, Discussion, Q&A

- a. Enforcement Plans/Process (Mallika)
  - a. Shared resources
  - b. Have any jurisdictions started enforcing?
    - i. HF&H Consultants Ensure that an enforcement system is in place, HF&H has not seen any of their clients having to go down the enforcement route yet.
    - ii. HF&H Consultants –For cities that rely on haulers to conduct food recovery implementation, encouraging clients to reach out to their haulers for follow up, especially if there are no agreement in place.
- b. Capacity Planning Reminder Due to County on May 16<sup>th</sup>, 2024.
  - 1. <u>County Tools, Trainings, and Presentation</u> (bottom of page)
- b. Tier 1 & 2 Questions & Discussion
  - 1. Past questions for CalRecycle: See Regional Guidance Doc for Responses
  - 2. RV Parks with Food Facilities question (CalRecycle?)
    - a. EcoTech Consulting Sent to CalRecycle, multiple cities raised the questions of whether RV parks with food facilities would fall under Tier 2 (hotel, food facility, etc.)?

- i. CalRecycle Probably not unless fitting the definition of a hotel. Are the RV parks residential or being rented out for lodging? The latter could potentially meet hotel definition.
  - EcoTech Consulting Some sites have both permanent residency and lodging for rent. What triggered this discussion was that on-site food facilities are over 5,000 sqft with large amounts of seating. Facilities have limited service and not a lot of excess food.
    - CalRecycle Cottages can fall under the hotel threshold. If the facility meets the restaurant definition, then Tier 2 Restaurant status may be applicable; however, if on-site facility is just for residents (such as a cafeteria), they most likely do not qualify as Tier 2.
    - b. North County Food Policy County RV parks are licensed by the State as vacation facilities. Mobile home parks are intended for permanent residency. There are several RV parks that have permanent residency as well.
      - i. CalRecycle If property is primarily residential, jurisdictions may use their best judgement to determine classification.
- c. Site Visits/Inspections DEHQ Myths and Challenges
  - i. DEHQ Q&A
    - 1. Solana Center Does the DEHQ have guidance on buffets?
      - a. County of San Diego DEHQ There are not any specific regulatory code limitations for buffet foods to be donated. From a food safety perspective, buffet foods are at a higher risk for exposure, holding temperature requirements still apply. For salad bars, there is an allowance for foods to go up to 45 degrees or below, but these foods cannot be saved for the next day. Will confirm later.
        - i. EcoTech Consulting Was under the impression that once food left back of house, it was non-donatable.
          - County of San Diego DEHQ Nothing in regulatory codes; however, DEHQ would still not recommend due to food safety concerns.
            - a. Feeding San Diego Feeding San Diego does not accept foods that were self-serviced. Partner agencies could form a partnership outside of FSD to donated self-service foods, but they ask their agencies not to donate/accepted these foods.
              - i. San Diego Food Bank concurred.
      - b. Canyon Crest Sustainable Initiatives Unsure if regional guidance document includes specifics regarding hospitals. Previously informed

that food from patients may not be compostable or donatable due to risk of illness.

- i. County of San Diego DEHQ Regarding food for patients, reach out to the California Department of Public Health, there are tighter restrictions due to adverse risks. Transportation and storage are main concerns as well.
  - 1. CalRecycle That is consistent with what CalRecycle has heard about hospital donation programs.
- ii. DEHQ offer to host a webpage on County website for regional SB1383 resources
  - 1. County staff met with DEHQ to discuss layout and content
  - 2. Ongoing request: All jurisdictions to add and/or update their resources on <u>Regional Guidance Document</u> under the tab Jurisdiction&DEH Contacts
- d. Food Recovery Organization Site Visits
  - i. Share feedback and response from recent site visits (group)
- e. Recordkeeping & Reporting (FRO's and Generators)
- f. Other roadblocks, concerns for discussion

### 4. SB 1383 – Public Education Resources

- a. San Diego Regional Food Systems GIS Map
  - i. North County Food Policy County Developing a non-public platform to map relationships between Tier 1s, Tier 2s, FROs, and FRSs. Currently working on mapping data from Coronado, Santee, and Chula Vista. Potentially receiving another intern for the summer.
    - 1. Goal is to utilize map to foster additional partnerships, reduce food waste, and make more efficient routes.
- b. Resources for Tier 2 Public Education:
  - i. Jurisdictions need to start understanding which FRO's and other orgs are best suited to accept prepared (Tier 2) foods.
  - ii. Options besides donation (Too Good to Go, donating to employees, donating to local homeless)
    - 1. HF&H Consultants Can guides be sent to executive committee so they can be placed on their website as well.
    - 2. Tracking by generators will be key.
- c. Food Bank updates on education efforts to partners
  - i. Feeding San Diego No updates outside of updating questions for agencies and supporting efforts towards capacity planning.
- d. Food donation videos (County led for regional use)

- i. SB 1383-specific and general food donation
  - County of San Diego If any jurisdictions would like to showcase specific photos for the video, please inform Joshua Keyton at <u>Joshua.Keyton@sdcounty.ca.gov</u>.

### 5. Grants & funding

- a. HF&H Consultants Local jurisdictions received additional funding from recent SB 1383 Grant, Brain's club, Canyon Crest Sustainable Initiatives, could partner with an existing non-profit and apply for funding support.
- b. Porchlight Will non-profits have opportunities for financial funding support? Capacity can be an issue for smaller non-profits, especially those not in partnership with a food bank.
  - i. EcoTech Consulting Yes, I believe so, mainly comes down to which jurisdiction that you're located in.
  - ii. HF&H Consultants Non-profits interested in SB 1383 local jurisdictional funding should connect with local city/county staff to learn more about funding opportunities.

### 6. Legislation

- a. California Constitution (Article XVI, Section 5) which provides: *"Neither the Legislature, nor any county, city and county, township, school district, or other municipal corporation, shall ever make an appropriation, or pay from any public fund whatever, or grant anything to or in aid of any religious sect, church, creed, or sectarian purpose, or help to support or sustain any school, college, university, hospital, or other institution controlled by any religious creed, church, or sectarian denomination whatever; nor shall any grant or donation of personal property or real estate ever be made by the State, or any city, city and county, town, or other municipal corporation for any religious creed, church, or sectarian purpose whatever; provided, that nothing in this section shall prevent the Legislature granting aid pursuant to Section 3 of Article XVI."* 
  - EcoTech Consulting Brought up during CRRA TC meeting, not a new additional to the CA Constitution. Reached out for more information, will be tabling it for now as we have not heard of any new information yet.
