PRIVATE PROPERTY DISPUTES: CONFLICT RESOLUTION GUIDE





Sometimes actions taken by community members on their property can impact neighboring properties. If issues like non-stormwater or sediment impacts do not reach County infrastructure (the road or storm drains), they are civil matters which need to be handled by the property owners. The State of California regulates some private property activities, but the County of San Diego does not have jurisdiction over these types of disputes. **The County created this guide to support private property-to-property conflict resolution related to flooding, erosion, and runoff.**

COMMON NEIGHBOR-TO-NEIGHBOR DISPUTES

Landscape changes that impact vegetation, structural integrity, or aesthetics can lead to conflicts between neighbors in the event that more water or sediment flows onto a nearby property. These changes can include replacing plants with concrete, drainage alterations, or adding a living space. Here are the typical causes of neighbor-to-neighbor disputes:



Flooding due to upstream landscape changes.



Erosion bringing sediment or stockpiled manure to downstream properties.



Higher runoff velocity caused by more concrete or other impermeable surfaces being added to upstream properties.


