## COMMUNITY PARAMEDIC SCOPE OF PRACTICE

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## I. PURPOSE

To define the scope of practice of community paramedics.

**II. AUTHORITY:** Health and Safety Code, Division 2.5, Sections 1797.107, 1830, and 1831. California Code of Regulations, Title 22, Division 9, Chapter 5, Section 100192.

## III. DEFINITION(S)

**Community Paramedic:** A paramedic licensed under Division 2.5 of the Health and Safety Code (HSC) who has:

- 1. completed the curriculum for community paramedic training,
- 2. received certification in one or more of the community paramedic program specialties described in Section 1815 of the HSC, and
- 3. is accredited to provide community paramedic services by CoSD EMS as a part of an approved community paramedic program.

### IV. POLICY

- **A.** During a patient encounter, a community paramedic shall use the standard paramedic scope of practice as described in P-401: Paramedic Scope of Practice, approved CoSD EMS local optional scope, and trial study scope if participating in an approved pilot program. In addition, a community paramedic shall adhere to the CoSD EMS community-paramedicine-specific protocols that are relevant to his/her training level.
  - 1. A paramedic who has only completed a triage to alternate destination specialty course may not utilize the expanded community paramedic scope of practice and must adhere to the standard P-401 scope of practice while transporting a patient to an approved facility.
  - 2. A paramedic who has completed training in multiple community paramedicine and triage to alternate destination specialties may use all applicable scopes of practice simultaneously as permitted by his/her agency in addition to the standard P-401 scope of practice.
  - 3. At no time shall a community paramedic respond to a 9-1-1 call unless it is related to the delivery of specific community paramedicine services. In this case, other paramedics working in a 9-1-1 capacity shall be the primary medical caregivers until a treatment plan

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can be established following patient stabilization. A community paramedic is permitted to be the primary medical response to a 9-1-1 call only if that patient is identified and approved in an agency's treatment plan for case management.

- **B.** A community paramedic may only provide community paramedicine services while working specifically in that role during a designed shift with an approved agency. A community paramedic is restricted to the standard P-401 policy while working solely in the 9-1-1 system, during an interfacility transport, during special assignments, during special events, or while working in any other capacity that is not solely related to community paramedicine.
- **C.** A community paramedic shall revert to the standard P-401 scope of practice if a patient is found to need emergent medical care during a community paramedicine contact. A standard ALS unit working in the 9-1-1 system shall take over medical care once on scene.
