| | | COVID-19 Vaccine Goal Vaccinate 70% of SD County population 16 and older by July 1, 2021 an equivalent of 1,882,544 residents Values currently include military families which will be vaccinated by the military – values will be updated once the numbers are provided Sites are strategically located at or by the Health Equity Quartile areas A new site is being opened in the South Bay/Otay area. Vaccinations are steadily increasing, with a steeper increase expected as more vaccine becomes available Currently 18.9% of SD residents have been vaccinated with one dose, 6.7% of SD residents have been completely vaccinated 882,150 doses have been received by the County and 742,169 doses have been administered 77,597 doses available to be administered There are 276 vaccine providers throughout the County 4 major providers to date in order of doses received are Acute Care Hospitals, County PODs, Partner PODs, and FQHCs EMT's/Paramedics are considered part of PODs There are 3 levels of pharmacy vaccinations: CDC Federal Partnership vaccinating SNFs and LTCFs, CDC partnership with CVS, Rite Aid and Walgreens and local pharmacies COVID 19 vaccine ecosystem is designed with health equity, accessibility and convenience to reach vulnerable populations 7 Outreach and Education providers and 4 community providers focused on reaching latinx, African American, and Asian American populations County operated PODs prioritize locations within or adjacent to Health Equity Quartiles | Action Plan | Lead | Date |
