WHAT IS LEAD POISONING?




- Lead poisoning is the accumulation of lead in the body
- Long-term exposure to lead can cause serious health problems
- Lead poisoning is 100% preventable
- Sources of childhood lead exposure include:
 - Dust
 - Soil
 - Water
 - Food or spices
 - Paint, toys, or other products



THE EFFECTS OF LEAD ON CHILDREN



- Harm a child's developing nervous system
- Cause anemia
- Decrease IQ
- Behavior problems (hyperactivity, irritability)
- Difficulty learning, paying attention
- Can damage kidneys and other organs
- Very high exposures can lead to seizures or death




Effects on children

- ← Death
- ← Coma
- ← Convulsions
- ← Brain Disease
- ← Kidney Disease
- ← Frank Anemia
- ← Colic
- ← Decreased Capacity to Transport Oxygen
- ← Increased Risk of Hypertension in Adulthood
- ← Body Can't Maintain Adequate Calcium Levels
- ← Developmental Toxicity
 - Decreased IQ Level
 - · Decreased Hearing
 - Decreased Growth
 - Impaired Nerve Function
 - Trans-Placental Transfer

Children Receiving Services from the County of San Diego Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program (CLPPP) by Year




BLL = Blood lead level. Includes children under 21 years of age at case identification. Services to children with a BLL 9.5-14.4 mcg/dL began in 2004. Categorization by level is based on a newly identified venous BLL. Grouped by year that CLPPP was notified of the BLL which may not be the same year services were initiated. Counts are subject to change as additional information becomes available.

CHILDREN RECEIVING SERVICES BY HHSA SERVICE REGION









Includes children with a newly identified venous BLL 9.5 mcg/dL or greater. Based on address at case identification. Three cases resided at two separate addresses at case identification; these addresses were located in separate regions. One case was identified out of county and 44 had unknown addresses at case identification. San Diego County is divided into six Health and Human Services Agency (HHSA) service regions, created by grouping contiguous zip codes.


PROBABLE SOURCES OF LEAD EXPOSURE







Probable Exposures of Children Receiving CLPPP Services, 2017-2021, N=252



Environmental sources continue to be the main sources of lead exposure in California. Includes children with a newly identified venous BLL 9.5 mcg/dL or greater. A case may have more than one exposure or there may be no source of exposure identified. Some cases were not assessed because a home visit was not done. In some cases, other potential sources, such as volcanic rock and home construction were found. The sources listed on this slide are not inclusive of all potential sources of exposure.


CATEGORIES OF PROBABLE SOURCES OF LEAD EXPOSURE







Categories of Probable Exposures of Children Receiving CLPPP Services, 2017-2021, N=252



Environmental sources continue to be the main sources of lead exposure in California.


Children under 21 years of age with a newly identified venous BLL 9.5 mcg/dL or greater. Includes cases where a probable source or sources were determined. Sources are grouped into three categories. Cases may have more than one source and fall into more than one category.

CDPH FUNDING BY TERM









- \$955,095 increase in new term
- Increase of \$318,365 per year

FUNDING ACTIVITIES



- Education to health care providers on screening, testing, and resources
- Outreach and prevention education to community partners, high risk groups and general public
- Case management services for children with elevated blood lead levels
- Environmental investigations of homes for children with elevated lead levels

LOOKING AHEAD



New Funding Requirements:

- Proactive inspections to identify and reduce lead hazards in high-risk areas to prevent lead-exposure to children.
- Activities to reduce risks of children being exposed to environmental lead hazards by investigating locations where children are being exposed, could be exposed, or have been exposed in the past, and responding as necessary with appropriate enforcement actions.






Outcome Indicators FY 21/22
