- **2.** Turn left on Farnham Street. Access to County Operations Center buildings will be on your right.



Full Route from Balboa Ave Transit Center to Overland Ave (if coming off Blue Line trolley):




If Using Trolley & Bus:

Mpox Task Force Recommended Action Items for Vaccine Equity:

- 1. Explore how to ensure the gender identity of those receiving the Mpox vaccine will be accurately recorded and reported.
- 2. Promote the availability and benefits of the Mpox vaccine to communities that have been disproportionately impacted.
- 3. Deliver messages by partnering with organizations, businesses, community groups, and others who are trusted by impacted communities.
- Utilize multiple channels to deliver health education via print materials (print media, flyers, brochures, and other written health information), social media (Instagram, TikTok, Grindr, etc.), and in-person outreach.
- 5. Incorporate Mpox messaging into existing HIV outreach and health education/risk reduction contracts.
- 6. Normalize Mpox vaccine by making vaccination a standard of care for persons being treated for HIV.
 - Coordinate with the Medical Standards and Evaluation
 Committee to discuss inclusion of Mpox in care standards.
- Normalize Mpox vaccine status by assessing for vaccine status in County STD clinics and providing the vaccine to individuals who are vulnerable to acquisition.
- 8. Explore feasibility of including Mpox vaccine during vaccine events such as the flu, COVID, or other diseases.

Mpox Hospitalization Data

- Out of 473 cumulative Mpox cases, 18 cases were hospitalized.
 - 10 (55.6%) were positive for HIV
 - Age range is between 27-58 (median age is 40.5)
 - o 17 male, 1 female



MPOX Confirmed and Probable Cases* by Episode Date,‡ San Diego County




MPOX VACCINATION DEMOGRAPHIC GRAPH Updated Monthly (First Tuesday) Data Through 06/05/2023

Chicago Mpox Outbreak

- April 17 May 5, 2023, 12 confirmed and 1 probable case
- All were symptomatic men
- 9 of 13 cases received 2 doses of Jynneos vaccine
- Among vaccinated, milder disease
- No hospitalizations






Mpox Modeling



- CDC estimated risk for local Mpox outbreak recurrence using mathematical modeling
- Based on risk (sexual behavior in MSM) + immunity (vaccination/natural)
- The higher the population prevalence of immunity the lower the likelihood of recurrence

Mpox Vaccine Effectiveness



In this study, adjusted VE was 75% for 1 dose and 86% for 2 doses of JYNNEOS vaccine, indicating substantial protection against mpox, irrespective of route of administration or immunocompromise status.

New studies show the JYNNEOS vaccine is effective in preventing mpox disease*

- No new Mpox infections since February 2023
- Vaccination is still effective for prevention despite outbreak in Chicago. Studies show 75% effectiveness for one dose and 86% effectiveness for 2 doses regardless of intradermal or intramuscular administration.
- Vaccination events occurred with The Transgender and Nonbinary Social Tuesdays, vaccinations events will be occurring with the Center and Pride.



Meningococcal Disease









Meningococcal Disease

Meningococcal disease is a rare, but very serious illness caused by a type of bacteria called *Neisseria meningitidis*. Even if treated quickly, meningococcal disease can cause long-term problems or be deadly. Getting vaccinated is the best way to prevent meningococcal disease.





Current Florida Outbreaks



- There is a large ongoing outbreak of meningococcal disease in Florida, primarily among gay, bisexual, and other men who have sex with men (MSM), including those living with HIV.
- Leon County, FL, has also reported a cluster of meningococcal disease cases among college and university students.
- CDC and the Florida Health Department are recommending that gay and bisexual men consider getting vaccinated/boostered with one of the available quadrivalent (ACWY) vaccines to prevent the disease.
- A similar outbreak occurred in Southern California in 2016 among MSM.





HOW IS IT SPREAD?



- Meningococcal disease is spread from close person to person contact.
- The bacteria that cause meningococcal disease are spread by exchanging respiratory and throat secretions (saliva or spit) during close (for example, coughing or kissing) or lengthy contact, especially if living in the same household.





Meningococcal Meningitis



Symptoms of Meningitis

 Meningitis is an infection or inflammation of the tissue that surrounds the brain and spinal cord.



- Symptoms of meningococcal meningitis include sudden onset of
 - Fever
 - Headache
 - Stiff neck.
- There can be additional symptoms, such as:
 - Nausea
 - Vomiting
 - Photophobia (sensitivity to light)
 - Confusion



Meningococcal Bloodstream Infection



- When someone has a meningococcal bloodstream infection, the bacteria can enter the bloodstream and multiply, damaging the walls of the blood vessels and causing bleeding into the skin and organs.
- Symptoms may include:
 - Fever or cold chills
 - Tiredness (fatigue)
 - Vomiting or diarrhea
 - Cold hands and feet
 - Severe aches/pain in muscles, joints, chest, or belly
 - Rapid breathing
 - A dark purple rash
- You can have meningitis & blood stream infection at the same time







June 10, 2022 <u>San Diego CAHAN</u> advised that:

- All persons living with HIV (≥2 months of age) who should receive two doses of MenACWY vaccine (Menveo® or Menactra®), 8-12 weeks apart, as their primary series.
- All men who have sex with men (MSM), regardless of HIV serostatus, should receive at least one dose of MenACWY vaccine (Menveo® or Menactra®). Because meningococcal vaccine induced immunity wanes, a booster dose is recommended for those with ongoing risk of exposure whose last dose of MenACWY was ≥ 5 years ago.
- Persons living with HIV and MSM should take the following steps to reduce the risk of invasive meningococcal disease:
 - Avoid sharing drinks, cigarettes, or other smoking equipment.
 - Avoid contact with saliva or other fluids from the mouth or nose of other persons.
 - Be aware condoms protect against sexually transmitted illnesses but may not reduce the risk of meningococcal disease.



Meningococcal Vaccines




- Two types of vaccine for different serotypes.
- Both vaccines are needed for protection against all 5 serogroups
- Since 2005 MenACWY was recommended for routine use among adolescents

On May 17, 2016, the County of San Diego Health and Human Services Agency Department of Public Health Services received accreditation from the Public Health Accreditation Board. If the physical attendance quorum requirement is met, AB 2449 permits a member who is not physically present to request virtual attendance at the local legislative body's meeting under two circumstances: (1) for "just cause" and (2) due to "emergency circumstances".

Qualifying Reason	Provisions to attend remotely	Requirements/Limitations
"Just Cause"	 There is a childcare or caregiving need (for a child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse, or domestic partner) that requires the member to participate remotely A contagious illness prevents the member from attending the meeting in There is a need related to a defined physical or mental disability that is not otherwise accommodated for Traveling while on official business of the legislative body or another state or local agency 	A member is limited to <u>two (2)</u> virtual attendances based on "just cause" per calendar year
"Emergency Circumstances"	"A physical or family medical emergency that prevents a member from attending the meeting in person." A member is <u>not</u> required to disclose any medical diagnosis or disability, or any personal medical information that is already exempt from existing law.	A member of the legislative body must make a request to the body to allow the member to meet remotely due to an emergency circumstance, and further must provide a general description of the circumstance justifying such attendance. A request from a member to attend remotely due to an emergency circumstance requires that the legislative body take action and <u>approve</u> the remote attendance at the start of the meeting for the member to be allowed to participate remotely for that meeting ¹ .

¹If the request does not allow sufficient time to be placed on the agenda as a proposed action item, then the legislative body may take action at the beginning of the meeting.

Additional Requirements for a Member Participating Remotely:

In addition to making a request either for "just cause" or due to an "emergency circumstance" for remote appearance, AB 2449 imposes the following three (3) additional requirements on legislative body members seeking to appear remotely at public meetings:

- 1. Before any action is taken during the meeting, the member must publicly disclose whether any other individuals 18 years of age or older are present in the room at the remote location with the member, and the general nature of the member's relationship with any such individuals.
- **2.** A member of the legislative body participating from a remote location must participate through both audio and visual technology.
- **3.** A member's remote participation cannot be for more than three consecutive months or 20 percent of the regular meetings for the local agency within a calendar year. And if the legislative body regularly meets fewer than 10 times per calendar year, a member's participation from a remote location cannot be for more than two meetings.

AB 2449 Checklist

(Applicable January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2025)

Procedures for Public Participation

- Public must be able to remotely hear, visually observe, and address the legislative body either remotely or in person in real time
- □ Public must have the opportunity to participate via: 1) two-way audio or 2) a telephonic service with a webcasting service
- □ Public cannot be required to submit comments prior to the meeting

Procedures for Member to Teleconference from a Remote Location

- □ Member must participate through both audio and visual technology
- Member must disclose adults who are present in the room at the remote location with the member and the general nature of the relationship with those individuals
- □ Member must submit a general description of the need to teleconference to the legislative body at the earliest opportunity (do not disclose any medical diagnosis or disability)
- □ Member may teleconference for just cause. Just cause is limited to 2 meetings per calendar year (see "Limits per Member" below). Just cause is defined as:
 - Child care or caregiving need of a child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse or domestic partner
 - Contagious illness that prevents member from attending in person
 - A need related to a physical or mental disability
 - Travel on official business of the legislative body or another state or local agency
- Member may teleconference due to <u>emergency circumstances</u>, which requires approval of the legislative body and which is defined as a physical or family medical emergency that prevents a member from participating in person
- □ <u>Limits per Member</u>: Just cause and emergency circumstances cannot be invoked collectively for more than: 1) two meetings if the legislative body has fewer than 10 meetings per calendar year, or 2) three consecutive months or 20 percent of regular meetings per calendar year if the legislative body has 10 or more meetings per year. Just cause cannot be invoked more than twice per calendar year.

Procedures for the Board/Commission/Committee/Group

- □ Include instructions on the agenda how the public can participate remotely
- A quorum of the members of the legislative body must participate in person at the noticed location that is open to the public
- A majority of the membership must approve a request by a member to teleconference due to <u>emergency circumstances</u>; include the request on the agenda if received in time
- All votes must be taken by roll call
- Meeting must be stopped and no action taken if the broadcast of the meeting or ability of the public to comment is disrupted
