WHATTOEXPECT









Once Tuberculosis (TB) is suspected, a Public Health team will visit you at home within a week. They will make sure you understand the process, your treatment plan, and the role of the Public Health Services TB Control staff.



DIRECTLY OBSERVED THERAPY (DOT)

Your nurse case manager will coordinate with a member of the Public Health team to meet with you daily to observe you taking your medication. This is to make sure you take the medication properly, are not experiencing side effects, and reduces chances of the drug not working (drug resistance).



SEEING YOUR DOCTOR

It is important to see your doctor monthly at the beginning of treatment.

Bring all your medicines to your doctor visits.



TB can infect others, so the people you spend time around will need to be tested for TB. Protect your family and friends by encouraging them to get tested. We will maintain your privacy and offer free TB testing to your contacts.
