




Purpose

• To protect, restore, and enhance habitat for the recovery of sensitive butterfly populations

• To establish an efficient regulatory permitting process for landowners, agricultural operators, businesses, and residents



Multiple Species Conservation Program (MSCP)



- Enacted by the County in 1997 with 11 other jurisdictions
- Incorporated Cities
 - MSCP (south coastal)
 - MHCP (north coastal)
- Unincorporated Area
 - South County Subarea Plan
 - North County Plan
 - East County Plan



Existing Threats to Butterflies

- Butterflies are experiencing decreases in population from key threats including:
 - More frequent and extreme droughts
 - Increased fires
 - Ongoing habitat loss and fragmentation
 - Increased isolation
 - Degraded habitat
- In order to make sure that the butterfly species don't go extinct, there are federal laws and rules that protect some of the species
 - These can be complied with through impact avoidance or federal permits

Grant Funding

- In 2022, the County Board of Supervisors accepted a U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (USFWS) Fiscal Year 2021 Cooperative Endangered Species Conservation Fund: Habitat Conservation Plan Planning Assistance grant
- Grant funding will support preparation of a County Butterflies Habitat Conservation Plan to protect sensitive butterfly species including:
 - Harbison's dun skipper
 - <u>Federally listed threatened</u> Hermes copper butterfly
 - o Federally listed endangered Laguna Mountains skipper
 - Federally listed endangered Quino checkerspot butterfly



Federal Endangered Species Act



Purpose

Conserve and protect plant and animal species at risk of extinction and conserve and protect the ecosystems upon which they depend

 Including species already listed as threatened or endangered, AND those in decline that might become listed in the future

"Take"

Under this law, cannot "take" listed species or remove habitat of a listed species

• "Take" generally means to harm, harass, or kill a species and can include removing habitat

Compliance

Development projects or landowners may need to obtain an Incidental Take Permit to move forward when engaging in activities that will likely impact a listed species or their habitat






Butterflies HCP

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

- Monarch butterfly
- Alkali skipper
- Thorne's hairstreak butterfly
- Wandering skipper



Criteria for the Covered Species List

Does the species occur in the Study

Is the species listed, or is it likely Area? to become listed during permit

Will the species be impacted by covered activities?

Do we have enough information on the species to assess impacts and prepare a conservation strategy?

Is the species covered by the **South County** Plan or will it need coverage in multiple **MSCP** planning areas?



Study Area


- Includes all the area where the Covered Species could be impacted and/or conserved
- Factors Considered:
 - Covered Species distribution and ranges
 - Predicted habitat
 - Connectivity
 - MSCP planning areas
 - Ecoregions
 - **Need for protection**
 - Jurisdictional boundaries







Butterflies HCP Study Area and MSCP Plan Areas







Plan Area and Permit Area

Plan Area

- Includes all the land necessary for the HCP to be implemented
- Area where all the covered activities (impacts) and conservation program will occur

Permit Area

- Includes all the land that may need incidental take permit coverage
- Area where all the covered activities (impacts) will occur
