October 13, 2020	The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors will conduct a random drawing of the qualified applicants at the Board of Supervisors meeting to select eight Commissioners.
October 22 and November 5, 2020	The selected eight Commissioners will meet to choose the remaining six Commissioners from the remaining pool of qualified applicants.



D. Experience Qualifications

State law requires candidates demonstrate experience in areas related to redistricting. Please provide responses to the following questions.

1. What experience do you possess that demonstrates analytical skills relevant to the redistricting process and voting rights, and demonstrates your ability to comprehend and apply the applicable state and federal legal requirements?

As a student and teacher of upper-division studies in comparative governments and American history, I have learned well the principles of democracy and the practical application of government systems from Colonial times to the present. I have sought to understand how those principles have been adapted to changing times while maintaining the basic tenets of personal liberty and community values to solve problems and to encourage self-reliance and progress.

During more than twenty-five years teaching at the secondary level, my skills and interests evolved through many educational reform efforts and my own personal growth, teaching me to develop the analytical skills needed to create relevant curricula and enriching learning experiences. Working with as many as 165 students every day challenged me to constantly reevaluate my lessons in order to reach the widest range of students' interests and abilities. I remember that I never presented the same lesson in exactly the same way twice, either in back-to-back daily periods or back-to-back school years, but was always tweaking something to improve on student outcomes. I was always a learner myself.

When I moved to San Diego in 1997, I found work as an educator working in State funded grant for inschool child protection programs. I immediately recognized the huge disconnect that existed between the public school and social service arenas. As a teacher, I had had little knowledge of and no contact with social service professionals; as a social worker, I did not feel trusted and had a very hard time gaining access to school-based programming. This was despite the fact that we were working to support the same students and families. This introduction fed my interest in grant-based funding and led me to become a grant writer myself. This new field challenged my analytical skills and research strategies. I wrote literally hundreds of proposals for a variety of agencies in the fields of social services, youth housing, mental health services, medical research and refugee resettlement. I often wrote to professionals who knew more about the subject that I did. No two Requests for Proposals (RFPs) were alike and each took careful analyses and unique approaches while following explicit guidelines. Each taught me something new that I was able to use in a subsequent RFP. As I progressed, I also assumed the role of contract analyst responsible for reporting outcomes back to the funder and assuring that the grant funds were being used as proposed. I became the eyes and ears of many donors, leading to subsequent funding and ongoing supportive relationships.

This evolution occurred during the dawn and explosion of the Internet. I remember the first time that I taught high school students the concept of "key word searching" Even reluctant learners could go to the library and search a database for a word they wondered about and find it successfully, even if it had not been included in the index of a book. That was an "aha" moment. Over the years, I have learned to use the Internet to expand my own horizons in personal as well as professional pursuits. I often say, "I was born for the Internet age.!" My skills continue to improve with every project. I am a semi-professional genealogist and use complex databases and worldwide resources to piece together the histories of my own family and those of relatives, friends and complete strangers. And then I produce the facts in various formats to be shared widely.

I was lucky to be raised in a loving and supportive family with clear expectations and consistent values. I was well educated in the public schools in Los Angeles and Pasadena, which qualified me for excellent programs at Northwestern University. After many years of teaching others, I achieved a graduate degree from the University of Washington that focused on analytical and research skill development for educators.

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2. What experience do you possess that demonstrates an ability to be impartial?

There is no venue more demanding of impartiality than classroom teaching. Every student expects and deserves to be included, cared for and appreciated. I doubt there is anyone who does not remember the teacher who punished the whole class for the sins of one person. Or the teacher who shared expectations only after the rules had been broken. Or one who threatened consequences that never were carried out. Students are wise to these qualities and quickly withdraw their respect and ability to learn from such adults. Successful teachers are those who understand the need to be viewed as impartial and work hard to overcome personal biases in order to see the potential in each person she meets.

Demonstrating the ability to be impartial takes time and consistency. It is observed by others who witness fair and even-handed responses to similar circumstances over time. Impartial people hold themselves accountable to the same standards that they impose upon others.

To be impartial is to know the standards and to apply them without prejudice. To demonstrate an ability to be impartial, it is imperative that you have clearly set standards so that everyone with whom you interact knows and accepts those standards. The trick comes with the understanding that not everyone shares the same point of view and that not everyone may be affected by your actions in the same way. An impartial person anticipates how the standards appear to individuals and tempers consequences with compassion.

In my professional roles, I have consistently been asked to take leadership roles in organizations of many sizes and pursuits. I have volunteered all my life in community and faith-based groups and have been recognized as a hard worker, someone unafraid of "getting her hands dirty," and a person who does what she promises. I take this as evidence that I have been trusted to lead, that I am impartial.

My greatest satisfaction from teaching and leadership roles came from children and adults of all backgrounds and abilities who evaluated me as fair - their way of saying I was "impartial."

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3. What experience do you possess that demonstrates an appreciation for the diverse demographics and geography of the County of San Diego?

I have learned a great deal about San Diego over the past 23 years by participating. I have had jobs with a variety of agencies. I have volunteered with non profit organizations. I have joined clubs to enrich my hobbies and interests. I have taken classes to improve my skills. I have enjoyed the beach, the desert, the mountains, the trails. I notice the people and places around me and engage others in conversation. I have made friends.

I have also had rich experiences in other communities. I was raised in Los Angeles and went to a new school in the eighth grade. I chose to go to college in the Midwest where I met great friends from all over the country. I returned to Pasadena to teach, married, had children and then moved to the Pacific Northwest to experience a new setting with new challenges and opportunities. All of these experiences have broadened by viewpoints and enriched my understanding of community. And each has made me value and appreciate San Diego more.

As a grant writer, I have learned about many of the specific issues that have challenged San Diego County over the last two decades. Often I was confronted with having to present my understanding to others who may have known much more about the subject than I. I had to present my proposal in a way that engendered their confidence in me and my organization. I had to demonstrate the views of conflicting forces and stake holders who affected the issues at hand. I had to speak for others and represent their points of view. I even sometimes had to promote causes in which I personally was not invested. The more I learned about San Diego and recognized what makes this community both typical and unique, the better I became at advocating for the citizens in San Diego County in a fair and impartial - and convincing - way, the more successful I became and the more I learned about this very special place in time.
