MISSION

The County of San Diego Independent Redistricting Commission (SD County IRC or the Commission) is committed to drawing a Supervisorial district map that will accurately and fairly represent the residents of San Diego County in accordance with applicable law, and to make it possible for as many broad and diverse voices as possible to participate in the redistricting process.

BACKGROUND

Every ten years, after the federal census, district boundaries for federal, state and local elected offices are redrawn to reflect new population data and shifting populations. This process is called redistricting. The SD County IRC must redraw the boundaries of its five supervisorial districts. The redrawing ensures that the five County supervisors elected to office fairly represent the County's diverse population.

Under new state law, <u>Elections Code Section 21550 et seq.</u>, and the County Charter, the SD County IRC is responsible for drawing the new district boundaries. The Commission must follow these criteria, in this order, when drawing the district map:

- ✓ Districts must be of equal population to comply with the US Constitution.
- ✓ Districts must comply with the Voting Rights Act to ensure that minorities have an equal opportunity to elect representatives of their choice.
- ✓ Districts must be contiguous, so that all parts of the district are connected to each other.
- ✓ Districts must minimize the division of cities, neighborhoods, and communities of interest to the extent possible.
- ✓ Districts should be geographically compact to the extent practicable, such that nearby areas of population are not bypassed for a more distant population.
- ✓ The place of residence of any incumbent or political candidate may not be considered and districts shall not be drawn for purposes of favoring or discriminating against a political party.
- ✓ Other redistricting criteria

KEY MESSAGES

What is the San Diego County Independent Redistricting Commission?

- The County of San Diego Independent Redistricting Commission (SD County IRC or the Commission) is comprised of 14 citizens from each of the County's five supervisorial districts, representative of the County's diversity. The Commission operates independently of the County Board of Supervisors.
- The SD County IRC is responsible for redrawing the boundaries of San Diego County's five supervisorial districts to reflect new and shifting populations, based on 2020 census data and other specified federal and state criteria.
- The SD County IRC is required by State law to hold public hearings and/or workshops and to accept public comment. The Commission is committed to hearing from as broad and diverse a population as possible from throughout the County, including non-English speaking communities.

Why is Redistricting Important?

- Participation in the redistricting process ensures that your voice is heard in determining where district boundaries are located for the purpose of electing members of the Board of Supervisors. Why is that important?
- The San Diego County Board of Supervisors oversee a \$6.5 billion budget. The Board decides how much money will be spent on the essential items that County governments provide: public safety, election services, health and human services, and much more.
- County redistricting determines which neighborhoods and communities are grouped together into a district for purposes of electing a member of the Board of Supervisors to represent them. Who gets elected, in turn, can impact how the County's resources are allocated.
- Redistricting only happens once every 10 years; residents have the opportunity to empower their community for the next decade.
- Public input works. Prior to the last redistricting cycle in 2010, the Barrio Logan community had been split in two along census tract lines, with a portion assigned to District 1 and another portion assigned to District 4. Due to public input during the 2010 redistricting process, the map was redrawn, restoring the community of Barrio Logan and assigning it wholly to District 1.

How can the Public get Involved?
